I HAVE WORSHIP ON MY MIND

I want to take you on a little expedition through life, thinking about our worship of God. We most often think of worship as what we do in the sanctuary of the church.

However, worship is not only what we do in the sanctuary or even adding in private or family worship. Worship is the life of the Christian. Worship is what we do 24-7 day after day. You can see why the apostle Paul wrote about praying without ceasing. That's 24-7. In our on-going relationship with God, we are constantly praying or worshiping. I do not mean that we are therefore sitting or kneeling or standing and verbally talking to God or singing to God.

No! Worship consists of how we are living our lives every day (including every minute). I'm going to suggest to you that worshiping the true God is absolutely necessary in the life of anyone who thinks he or she is a person of God – a God follower – a Christian. Hang in here with me.

What is worship? It is the life of a God-follower. It is the life of a Christian. If we examine the lives of the people of God in the Bible, we see various people who by their lives are worshiping. Again, I'm not talking about going to the tabernacle or temple. Let's look at some notable people.

The Bible begins with God's creation of the cosmos and everything in it. Adam and Eve were the first humans. They walked with God in the Garden of Eden. While we do not see much of their dialog with God, we do recognize that they are honoring God, holding Him in esteem. That's a facet of their worship.

We then see Cain and Abel, both sacrificing something to God. As the book of Hebrews tells us, Abel's sacrifice was made in faith. There is another component of worship. The Bible teaches that we cannot please God without faith. Therefore faith is another component of worship.

Going further in the Bible we see Enoch, a man taken into God's presence alive. On earth he walked with God, living a life devoted to God. That is what we do in our worship – live our lives devoted to God.

Noah spent a hundred years building the ark in which God was going to save Noah and his family along with pairs of animals and birds. What was evident in Noah's life with God? His obedience. Can you imagine working 100 years to build and ark 450 feet long by 75 feet wide and 45 feet tall? That is obedience. By the way, none of these people were perfect. They were sinners too, but they were people connected to God.

You probably recognize the name Samuel. I do not think there is one thing in the Bible about Samuel displeasing God. He was certainly a sinner like us. But he was utterly zealous for God. He pleased the Lord immensely in his daily life and daily zeal for God.

King David lived a life of ups and downs, but inspired by God he spoke many psalms in which he exalted God – living outwardly in adoration, speaking his adoration and boasting about God. In many other psalms, he encourages us to exalt God. You are catching on, I'm sure. Yes, exalting God is part of our worship 24-7. We have now identified six facets of our daily worship. These are things we do daily – not just in a brief time set aside for "worship," but a life of worship.

I think we can nicely identify eight facets of worship. We have two more to explore. Who was known for revering God? I'd pick out Paul, who wrote many epistles that are in the Bible. His epistles express his reverence for God and encourage us to revere God. The God who rescued us from our path to eternal destruction certainly deserves our reverence.

If you have been thinking through facets of worship as you are reading, you can probably identify our eighth facet of 24/7 worship – love. Our model here is the apostle John. John loved Jesus and saw the power of love through Jesus. Yes, love for Jesus, for the Triune God, is another facet of our on-going worship.

I'll make this point: <u>These facets of worship are what followers of God do daily.</u> Oh, we do not do that perfectly; we are sinners – sinners rescued by God through Jesus. But I hope you can see that this is what we strive for – <u>living every minute of every day in worship</u>. We live our worship while we work, we study, we pray, we go about our jobs. But we do it all as we live in worship to God.

When we live that way daily, we will be eager to come together with fellow worshipers on the Lord's day – the day set aside for holy things. Let me encourage you to individually and as a couple and as a family to grow in these facets of worship. We have an awesome God and He has with great mercy and grace brought us into His kingdom. The Triune God deserves all our worship – 24/7. To Him be all the praise and glory. Amen
