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

TRUE LOVE LEADS TO TRUE PASSION

During the month of February our thoughts obviously turn to St. Valentine's Day and all that the holiday implies. The world (and especially Hallmark) want you to believe that *True Love* Leads to *True Passion*... specifically the obsessive passion of buying romantic greeting cards and lots of chocolate for the loved ones in your life. Instead of chocolates, many health- or weight-conscious folks will often get a bouquet of flowers or a live plant for the one they love this year. Frivolity aside (and no matter what Hallmark might say), according to the Bible *True Love* is the willingness, the *Passion*, to give up everything for the object of your love—even when your beloved is unworthy of your love.

This is the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, because this is exactly what Christ did. "While we were still sinners, Christ died for the ungodly"—while we were unworthy of His love, He came down from heaven, lived on this ball of dirt for over thirty years, and then He suffered and died a painful, horrible death... and He did it all for you, and for me. Scripture proclaims this Truth to us, if we have ears to listen. Godly love, *True Love*, is described for us in First Corinthians 13:

If I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but do not have love, I have become a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have the gift of prophecy, and know all mysteries and all knowledge; and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. And if I give all my possessions to feed the poor, and if I deliver my body to be burned, but do not have love, it profits me nothing. Reflecting the love of God, however poorly, is the hallmark of Christian faith. It is a gift, not a merely a work. If you have the Holy Spirit, which all believers have, this love will be there, somehow, somewhere.

Love is patient, love is kind, and is not jealous; love does not brag and is not arrogant. This love is not natural or reflexive to a human being. Patience and kindness are hard, but worth the effort for the one who loves. Because this love is a gift and not the product of our sinful selves, we know that whatever good you see in us is God at work, and therefore something we must give God thanks for not something we can take credit for.

[Love] does not act unbecomingly; it does not seek its own, is not provoked, does not take into account a wrong suffered. It is hard to avoid the reality that such love is focused outward, and not focused in on one's self. It is about doing for the other, not having them do for me.

[Love] does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth. This is so utterly other than human nature! We tend to rejoice when what we want is accomplished and grieve when our desires are thwarted or unfulfilled, but love goes another direction. Some of us can be like this some of the time, but even those who succeed can tell you it is not easy, it is not fun and it is not always comfortable.

[Love] bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Such love is patient, and finds its power in God and faith in God.

Love never fails; but if there are gifts of prophecy, they will be done away; if there are tongues, they will cease; if there is knowledge, it will be done away. For we know in part, and we prophesy in part; but when the perfect comes, the partial will be done away. This is why such a love cannot be fallen out of. It is a love of will and intellect as much or more than it is of feeling. Feeling will often accompany this love, but feelings come and go. Love does not. It never fails. God never fails us.

When I was a child, I used to speak as a child, think as a child, reason as a child; when I became a man, I did away with childish things. That selfish love of the flesh will happen to everyone, even true Christians. They simply are not content in it. They know more in the love of God, and they want to do and have more themselves. A fleshly love that cannot be replaced with an agape type is a love that a Christian should walk away from because it is not who they are called to. It is simply the flesh.

For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face; now I know in part, but then I shall know fully just as I also have been fully known. Clearly, Paul has been writing here about how Christ loves us, not so much how we will love. This is just a picture for us of our Lord's love, so we have a pattern to follow. When we finally get there, meaning heaven, we will understand, and be able to love completely like this. In the meantime, we have a pattern and we have a Savior from sin and death and weakness.

But now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love. Today the world wants True Love to lead to wonderful, romantic acts of passion. But the world refuses to accept that True Love, and True Passion, often involve hard work, sacrifice, and suffering. We Christians know differently. We know the truth. We know and remember that the True Love of God is what lead to Christ's Passion (His suffering and death) for us—and all this based solely on His love and mercy, not on anything we did, and certainly not on who we are. The truth of the matter is that Jesus Christ is the best example of True Love and True Passion we have on this earth.

So, when the world tells you that cards, chocolate, or gifts of jewelry are the way to win someone's heart, remember that their heart has already been won—bought and paid for—by Jesus of Nazareth. <u>He alone</u> is the source of *True Love* and *True Passion*, in this world and the next.

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The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod LCMS Stewardship Ministry – Newsletter Article – FEBRUARY 2022

The season of Epiphany focuses on how God was made manifest in the flesh of Jesus. The church spends time hearing of the miracles, signs, and wonders of Jesus in the world. And this made plain to all that Jesus really is who He said He was. He is the Second Person of the Holy Trinity, the only begotten Son of the Father, in the flesh. For "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14).

It is revealed for all the world to see that Jesus is God in the flesh. It is made manifest by His words and His work, by what He said and by what He did. And these belong together, for "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Jesus is the Word and will of God in the flesh, that is, He is the walking, talking enactment of God's Word.

It is no different for us. We are called not just to believe in God in hearts but also to trust in God in word and deed. As James wrote: "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves" (James 1:22), and again, "What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? ... So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. ... Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. ... For as the body apart from the spirit is dead, so also faith apart from works is dead" (James 2:14, 17–18, 26).

Our faith is lived out in works for our neighbor. Our trust in the Word and will of God is lived out not in word only but also in deed and in truth. In other words, the Epiphany of the Lord creates in us an epiphany of our faith in our works of obedience to God who commanded them. By this, our faith is made manifest to the world. It is, as Luther wrote of faith:

Faith is a divine work in us. It changes us and makes us to be born anew of God (John 1). It kills the old Adam and makes altogether different people, in heart and spirit and mind and powers, and it brings with it the Holy Spirit.

Oh, it is a living, busy, active, mighty thing, this faith. And so it is impossible for it not to do good works incessantly. It does not ask whether there are good works to do, but before the question rises, it has already done them, and is always at the doing of them.

He who does not these works is a faithless man. He gropes and looks about after faith and good works and knows neither what faith is nor what good works are, though he talks and talks, with many words about faith and good works.

Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that a man would stake his life on it a thousand times. This confidence in God's grace and knowledge of it makes men glad and bold and happy in dealing with God and all His creatures. And this is the work of the Holy Spirit in faith. Hence a man is ready and glad, without compulsion, to do good to everyone, to serve everyone, to suffer everything, in love and praise to God, who has shown him this grace.

And thus it is impossible to separate works from faith, quite as impossible as to separate burning and shining from fire. Beware, therefore, of your own false notions and of the idle talkers, who would be wise enough to make decisions about faith and good works, and yet are the greatest fools. (*Preface to the Book of Romans*)

So, then, let our faith be active by God's power in the Word through the Holy Spirit. And let then our faith be made manifest to the world by what this faith does: serving our neighbor – in church, in the family, and society – with the works of faith in time, talents, and treasures.



WHAT WE BELIEVE

Scripture Alone

We believe that the Holy Scriptures in their entirety are the inspired and infallible Word of God and that they alone are the only source and norm of faith and life for the Christian. We believe that the Bible is complete and requires no additions from any other source and that it clearly reveals God's plan of salvation for mankind.

Faith Alone

We believe that man was originally created holy by God but later rebelled against God and is now, by his nature, spiritually dead and blind. Only when man is brought to faith by the Holy Spirit working through the Word of God is it possible for man to be saved. Faith is God's work - not man's work - and comes only by hearing the Word of God. Man is justified before God by faith alone and not by good deeds.

Grace Alone

We believe that we are saved by grace alone and that man cannot earn his way into God's favor. Grace is the undeserved love of God who sent His Son Jesus into the world to take our place under God's law and to suffer and die to pay the penalty for our sins. Whoever trusts in that redemptive act of Jesus Christ will not perish but have everlasting life.
